What we are dealing with

The Women's Housing Company client group faces unprecedented challenges in finding safe, secure and affordable homes.

- 50,000-plus approved applicants on the NSW social housing waiting list are waiting up to 10 years for housing¹
- Single older women are the fastest growing group experiencing homelessness²
- Domestic and family violence is a leading driver of homelessness for women from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds³
- Virtually no homes in Greater Sydney are affordable for renters on low and very low incomes.⁴

Who we help

The Women's Housing Company houses almost 1,100 women, along with their children across Greater Sydney, the Hunter and Coffs Harbour.

Our resident community embraces women aged 18-96, including some of the most housing-vulnerable women:

- Older, single women
- Women and their children escaping domestic violence
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women
- Culturally and linguistically diverse women
- Women living with disability
- Young women.




What we do

We make a difference to the lives of vulnerable women by:

- Housing women on very low to moderate incomes who cannot afford market housing
- Preventing and responding to women's homelessness
- Connecting women to support and communities
- Creating pathways to employment and opportunity
- Providing a safe haven for women at risk of violence
- Advocating for women.

The Women's Housing Company provides accommodation to eligible women across the housing spectrum.



How we work

The Women's Housing Company drives a sustainable business to secure our future and that of the women we house.

We develop five-year Strategic Plans and annual Business Plans to guide our activities and investments, and to be transparent and accountable for our performance.

We partner with other organisations that share our values to achieve our business objectives and support residents to sustain their tenancies and lead fulfilling lives.

We explore all avenues to source more housing that is affordable, including new housing ventures with developers, purchase of existing housing stock, contracts with Government to manage social housing, leaseholds in the private market, and fee-for-service arrangements with local government and others.

We compete for and win Government contracts to extend our reach and impact. Since 2014 we have managed homelessness services for women in the south west of Sydney for the NSW Government, providing crisis accommodation for women escaping domestic violence and supporting women from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

We innovate to problem solve housing challenges and to continuously improve our performance and impact.

We are strong advocates for women with Government, the private sector and in the community to shape policy and programs, seek investment in their futures, and call out injustice.

Older women's housing development February 2020

The Pendle Hill Project is home to 22 women aged 55 and over. The Women's Housing Company worked with the NSW Government, developer Blue Sox and Cumberland Council on this collaborative model for the not-for-profit, government and development sectors to address the housing shortage for older women.

Award-winning housing design August 2017

The Woolloomooloo Women's Housing Project is home to 20 women. It is a life-changing sanctuary in the inner city that fosters social connection and neighbourhood. A partnership project with the NSW Land and Housing Corporation, it won an Urban Development Institute of Australia (UDIA) 2020 Award for Excellence in Affordable Housing.
